Some schools may require proof of a recent routine dental checkup. Scheduling one before the start of the school year is a great way to ensure your child's oral health is in good shape, and help prevent emergencies later.

It may be time for your child to see a dentist if their last exam was over 6 months ago or you notice any of these signs:

- · Tartar build up around teeth and gums
- · Bleeding or swollen gums
- · Tooth pain or sensitivity
- Persistent bad breath (even after brushing)
- · Visible cavities, discoloration or injury

Chronic gingivitis is the most common and treatable type of gum disease in children.³ It occurs in about 50% of children up to the age of 5 and increases to nearly 100% by the time they reach puberty.⁴ During teen years, when hormones fluctuate, parents should keep a keen eye out for symptoms.

- · Remind them to floss and brush twice a day
- Keep them hydrated with water and limit sugary foods and drinks
- Replace your child's toothbrush every 3 to 4 months
- · Take your child to the dentist for regular teeth cleanings
- Use a mouthguard during sports activities to prevent injury
